

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### What is the issue? Why is health insurance availability a problem?

Health insurance availability is a serious issue because our health and appearance are not only important to our standard of living, but also to how we are perceived by others. If low-Employer does not offer or ineligible for coverage income people are unable to get the medical attention that they need, then the lower-class citizens will continue getting sick or injured, while also continuing to go untreated. This results in the development of chronic conditions throughout the low-income population, and the further social segregation of upper and lower classes.



This is primarily due to the financial inconvenience that comes with having insurance. On average, the monthly payment for health insurance per individual is \$574. That number jumps up to \$1,634 for the average family coverage (Ramsey). "In 2019, 73.7% of uninsured adults said that they were uninsured because the cost of coverage was too high" (Tolbert).

Dangerous jobs: US fatal work injuries by industry for 2016





of their lack of higher education. Because of this, they are typically the ones forced to work in the less-favorable, and oftentimes dangerous fields, such as working construction or in warehouses.

#### <u>Facts</u>

→ "Many people do not have access to coverage through a job, and some people, particularly poor adults in states that did not expand Medicaid, remain ineligible for financial assistance for coverage" (Tolbert).



- → "Undocumented immigrants are ineligible for Medicaid or Marketplace coverage" (Tolbert).
- → "Racial, ethnic, socioeconomic and other minority groups are more likely to delay healthcare and to go without the necessary healthcare or medication they should have been prescribed" (Mandal).
- → "Racial and ethnic minorities are often given a health insurance plan that limits the amount of services available to them as well as the number of providers they can use" (Mandal).
- → Young single men are the lowest-risk group when it comes to health insurance (Ramsey).


### **Statistics**

- → "3 in 10 uninsured adults in 2019 went without needed medical care due to cost" (Tolbert).
- → "In 2019, 9.2% of people, or 29.6 million, were not covered by health insurance at the time of interview, according to the ACS, up from 8.9% and 28.6 million" (Keisler-Starkey).



→ "The number of uninsured children grew by over 327,000 from 2018 to 2019 and the uninsured rate for children ticked up nearly 0.5 percentage points from just under 5.1% in 2018 to 5.6% in 2019" (Tolbert).

### The numbers (based on U.S. averages)

#### INCOME

\$994 (average weekly income in the U.S. according to U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics) → \$51,688 (average annual salary im the U.S.)

<u>EXPENSE</u> \$574 (spent on health insurance per individual per month) x 12 months = **\$6,888/year** spent on health insurance per individual

REMAINDER \$51,688 - \$6,888

\$44,800 (≈\$3,733/month) left over to pay for rent/mortgage, car insurance, gas, electricity, food, etc.
